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


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I am grateful for the continued support of all partners and stakeholders. ATMIS continues to make significant progress and achieve milestones in our mandate to support the government and people of Somalia in ensuring a secure, stable, and progressive nation.

This progress would not have been possible without your collective and individual efforts and the close collaboration of our partners.

ATMIS handed over Six Forward Operating Bases (FOBs) to the Somali Security Forces and reduced its troop numbers in Somalia by 2,000 as part of the UN and African Union-approved phased approach to the phase three drawdown. The FOBs included Bariire, Jowhar Town, Ceel Eglow, Abdalla Birolle, Orahsan and Kuday, marking a significant step toward transferring full security responsibilities to the Somali Security Forces by end of December 2024.

ATMIS commends the commitment, wisdom, and achievements of the former distinguished Force Commander, Lt. Gen. Sam Okiding, who left the mission to serve as the Deputy Chief of the Uganda Peoples Defence Forces (UPDF).

I'd like to welcome the new ATMIS Force Commander, Lt. Gen. Sam Kavuma, who officially assumed his duties in July. Lt. Gen. Kavuma

brings a wealth of experience to the mission, having served in various capacities in an illustrious military career, including as the commander of Ugandan troops under the African Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM).

I also welcome the communiqué of the 1225th Meeting of the African Union Peace and Security Council on the adoption of the Concept of Operations (CONOPs) for the new AU-led Mission in Somalia, the African Union Support and Stabilization Mission in Somalia (AUSSOM), the successor mission to ATMIS. Notably, the adoption of the CONOPs will facilitate a smooth transition, build capacity for Somali security forces, and ensure robust force protection measures.

We continue to implement policing activities as part of our mandate. In the area of capacity building, I'm pleased to inform you that we have conducted training programmes such as community policing, child protection, station management, fingerprint techniques and training of trainers (ToT). Our police officers continue to co-locate with their Somali counterparts as part of ongoing mentorship duties.

ATMIS Formed Police Units (FPUs) have been supporting their Somali counterparts in conducting day and night patrols in Mogadishu and the federal state capitals of Kismayo and Baidoa. Additionally, our FPUs also provide VIP escorts, guard and other special duties within our police mandate.

Furthermore, in preparation for the new mission, a joint AU-UN delegation visited Somalia in September and held extensive and productive discussions with representatives from the African Union (AU), United Nations (UN), Federal Government of Somalia (FGS), Troop Contributing Countries (TCCs) and international partners on the transition and financing of the mission to succeed ATMIS. The discussions focused on preparing a comprehensive report on the overall mission design and financing options for the African Union Support and Stabilisation Mission in Somalia (AUSSOM), in line with UN Security Council Resolution 2748 (2024).

Also, in October, alongside the Acting Special Representative of the Secretary-General (ASRSG) for Somalia, James Swan, I briefed the UN Security Council on the security situation in Somalia, status of the transition and preparations for the follow-on mission to ATMIS.

Within our broader responsibility of supporting the local population, ATMIS has implemented several Quick Impact Projects (QUIPs). These projects have been instrumental in improving the livelihood of the population living next to our camps. Some of the projects implemented in the last few months include the recently launched solar-powered water projects in Kismayo and Baidoa by ATMIS Police component in support of the Somali Police Force with funding from the Government of Kazakhstan.

ATMIS will continue to collaborate with the Federal Government and other partners to protect the gains made in restoring peace and stability in Somalia.

ATMIS and Somali Medics complete Battlefield Emergency Care Training

On 16 May, medical officers from ATMIS, the Somali Security Forces (SSF) and the UN Support Office in Somalia (UNSOS), completed a three-day training programme on providing emergency care to battlefield casualties.

The training, organised by UNSOS and facilitated by instructors from the Nairobi-based Kenya Red Cross Training Institute, aimed to enhance ATMIS and SSF medical personnel's capacity to provide robust pre-hospital medical support during joint military operations.

"This training is critical in reducing the risk of losing our brave soldiers due to improper management of injuries sustained on the frontline," said the Head of ATMIS, Ambassador Mohamed Fl-Amine Souef.

Ambassador Souef further emphasised that the training would not only improve treatment emergency for soldiers but also benefit local communities.

"The skills and knowledge gained during this training will enable our medical personnel to provide critical assistance to civilians. This will strengthen the bond between security forces and communities," noted Ambassador Souef.

The Head of UNSOS, Assistant Secretary-General, Aisa Kirabo Kacyira, said the training was an important contribution to ongoing efforts to enhance the skills and capabilities of SSF and ATMIS personnel in order to facilitate a smooth and sustainable transfer of security responsibilities.

"Capacity building is one of the key cornerstones of ensuring a successful security transition from the African Union mission to the Somali Security Forces. eauippina our medical Βv personnel with the necessary skills and knowledge, we are not only supporting the safety and well-being of our troops but

also contributing the broader to goal of enabling Somalia to take its rightful position in maintaining peace and stability within its borders, " said Kacyira.

The 53 participants expressed their gratitude

and pledged to share the acquired knowledge with their counterparts.

"We have acquired critical skills that will save lives on said the battlefield," Chief Adjutant Melchiade Marisasi, an anaesthesiologist from the ATMIS Burundi contingent based in Jowhar.

Osman Abdi Osman, a medic from the Somali National Army (SNA) Hospital in Mogadishu, pledged to apply his newly acquired skills to save more military and civilian lives.

"This training is timely and enhances our skills. It will leave a lasting impact on our clinical practice and patient care," said Dr. Capt. Patrick Otim from ATMIS Level II Hospital in Mogadishu.

The comprehensive course covered essential topics such as Pre-Hospital Trauma Life Support (PHTLS), Basic Life Support (BLS), and Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS), equipping participants with a wide range of skills to effectively manage medical emergencies in both military and civilian settings.

Somali and ATMIS personnel take on IED threats



At least 80 officers from ATMIS and the Somali Security Forces (SSF) in May completed a threeday training on countering Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs) used by armed opposition groups, including Al-Shabaab.

The training, facilitated by the UN Mine Action Service (UNMAS) and the United Kingdom Mission Support Team (UK-MST), aimed to enhance SSF operational efficiency in dealing with IED risks in the Federal Member States.

The programme covered various aspects of IED detection, disposal, and post-blast investigation techniques.

"This training was pivotal in the actualisation of the ATMIS mandate to degrade Al-Shabaab in support of the Somali-led peace and security process," said ATMIS military Chief of Staff, Brig. Gen. Kindu Gezu.

Brig. Gen. Gezu stressed the importance of continued vigilance in countering IED threats, which are Al-Shabaab's primary weapon of choice. UNMAS Chief Justin Smith highlighted the successful collaboration between ATMIS, SSF, and UNMAS over the years. This has allowed troops to detect and neutralise a lot of IEDs planted by Al-Shabaab militants.

ATMIS counter-IED teams have discovered and safely detonated 439 devices since 2017, preventing 1,756 potential casualties.

"In 2023 alone, ATMIS Search and Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) teams found and cleared 74 percent of devices assessed as targeting ATMIS troops, preventing 150 potential ATMIS casualties," said Justin.

ATMIS military Chief Engineer, Col. Suleiman Ibrahim, urged partners to effectively tackle the IED menace to reduce threats to livelihoods, infrastructure, and humanitarian efforts.

"Effective counter-IED efforts require ingenuity, adaptability, and the application of basic tenets. The fight against the IED menace is not easy and requires concerted efforts by all stakeholders," Col. Suleiman observed.

Somalia National Army's Chief Engineer, Col. Adan Abdullahi Ali, thanked ATMIS, UNMAS, and UK-MST for providing relevant skills and equipment to Somali soldiers to maintain peace and stability.

During the training, participants discussed Somalia's IED threats, the Somali National Army's threat assessment, and ongoing counter-IED operations.

UNMAS and ATMIS work jointly to improve the capacity of SSF personnel by equipping them with skills and facilities to detect and destroy IEDs that pose a threat to civilian safety.



SPF detectives train on Fingerprint Analysis

On 23 May, Somali Police Force (SPF) detectives in Hirshabelle State completed a five-day intensive training on fingerprint investigation and evidence gathering.



ATMISPolicepersonnelconducted the training to equip Somali police officers with the skills and knowledge to investigate and handle complex crimes.

The detectives were instructed in topics such as collecting fingerprints at crime scenes, analysing fingerprints and matching them with databases, crucial to identifying and arresting suspects.

Lt. Ahmed Abdulle Madoobe, deputy commander of Jowhar airfield police station thanked ATMIS for organising the training. He noted that the training would enable the SPF to conduct thorough and professional investigations. The ATMIS Police lead trainer in Jowhar, ASP Earnest Agbo, emphasised that the training would enhance police investigative skills using modern scientific methods.

"We are happy to have imparted law enforcement skills to our Somali counterparts. This will help them identify suspects, solve crimes, and support Somalia's quest for peace and stability," said ASP Agbo at the end of the training.

Abdullahi Mohamed Osman, a participant in the training, thanked ATMIS and called for more capacity building initiatives to assist the Somali Police Force.

ATMIS has conducted similar capacity building trainings for the Somali Police Force in federal member states of Southwest, Jubaland State and Benadir.



Combating terrorism financing

At the end of May, ATMIS Police trained criminal investigation officers from Hirshabelle State Police on how to detect and combat financial crimes.

The training covered theoretical and practical aspects of financial intelligence, money laundering detection, investigating corruption and fraud, and understanding investigative methods.

"With the ever-growing incidents of financial crimes and terrorism financing in Africa and globally, ATMIS

recognises the need to build our Somali police counterparts' capacity to respond to these threats," said ASP Ernest Agbo, the ATMIS Police lead trainer in Jowhar.

According to ASP Agbo, the Somali police personnel who participated in the training, were now wellprepared to detect and stop illegal financial dealings and fight terrorism financing.

The Hirshabelle State police traffic commander Col. Hassan Daud thanked ATMIS for its continued support and mentorship of the Somali Police Force. He requested further training sessions from ATMIS. "I want to express my gratitude to ATMIS for the capacity building training they offered to the Hirshabelle State Police. I urge the officers to make efficient use of the skills they have acquired and request ATMIS to conduct more training and mentorship programmes for us," said Col. Hassan at the end of the training.

"As we handover key locations to the Federal Government of Somalia and drawdown, we must continue to initiate environmental restoration efforts in our Forward Operating Bases (FOBs) and communities," he said.

ATMIS pledged to plant 30,000 trees at 58 Forward Operating Bases (FOBs) by 2024 in support of President Hassan Sheikh Mahamud's "Regreening Somalia" initiative, which aims to plant 10 million trees to enhance the country's climate resilience and combat droughts.

Mr. Zenenga, the UN deputy special representative commended Somalia's commitment to conservation through the African Union-led Great Green Wall Initiative, which aims to increase arable land in the Sahel.

"The successful community-led initiatives in Somalia, such as participation in the Great Green Wall Initiative to address desertification, climate change, and biodiversity loss are evidence of the commitment to preserving the environment," he noted.

This support ensures that approximately 37,200 students across Somalia have equal access to education, regardless of their location. They will be prepared for future challenges and opportunities," said Ambassador Souef.

ATMIS Police launch water projects in Federal Member States

In August, ATMIS Police Commissioner toured Jubaland, South West and Hirshabelle states to launch water projects to benefit Somali Police officers and local communities.



Police Commissioner of the African Union Transition Mission in Somalia (ATMIS), Assistant Inspector General of Police (AIGP), Hillary Sao Kanu toured Jubaland, South West and Hirshabelle states in August to launch water projects for police officers and local communities.

AIGP Kanu's tour began with key visits to Jubaland Police Headquarters in Kismayo and Baidoa, South West's administrative capital, where she launched the solar-powered water project at Bakiin Police Post.

"The construction of these boreholes will meet the water needs of the Somali Police Force (SPF) and the local community. The project aims to create a healthy environment for the SPF to efficiently perform their duties," AIGP Kanu said in Baidoa. She stressed that the projects are crucial for strengthening police-community partnerships, critical in the peacebuilding process.

"There is a need for effective communication and shared intelligence between the police and community. I believe this project will enhance the much-needed collaboration," she added.

Acknowledging the significance of Quick Impact Projects (QIPs) in empowering SPF officers to effectively perform their duties, AIGP Kanu underscored ATMIS's commitment to improving the lives of Somalis.

"These projects are crucial in improving the lives of the host nation. ATMIS has previously undertaken Quick Impact Projects, including hospitals and schools. We have started with the water project because water is life," AIGP Kanu said. The Kazakhstan Government is financing the Bakiin water project in the Bay region, scheduled for completion within 60 days.

The 10,000-liter facility will serve the Bakiin Police Station and the surrounding community, including Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in neighbouring Hannan and Towfig IDP camps.

"It is important that the water project also serves the community, as this will help create a strong bond between the police and the civilian population," AIGP Kanu said.

During the tour, the ATMIS Police Commissioner met Jubaland Police Commissioner, Col. Sadiq Mohamed Dhogor, and Bay Regional Police Commander, Col. Amin Mohamed Osman, to discuss ways of strengthening cooperation between ATMIS and the Somali Security Forces.

Col. Dhogor thanked AIGP Kanu for supporting the capacity building of the Somali Police Force (SPF), through training and mentorship programmes. "With the increasing needs, particularly in newly liberated areas such as Buula Haji, where approximately 5,000 families reside, the demand for police services is significant," said Col. Dhogor.

Col. Osman commended ATMIS for increasing access to water in the region.

"We are grateful to ATMIS for this project and for always coming to the aid of the Somali people. The water will benefit all of us, including our livestock. We also commit to taking care of it once the project is complete," said Col. Osman.

AIGP Kanu later proceeded to Jowhar, the administrative capital of Hirshabelle State, where she launched a similar project for Somali Police officers and local communities.

The ceremony in Jowhar was attended by the Hirshabelle State Deputy Police Commissioner, Col. Hassan Kaafi, and the Coordinator of the ATMIS Police Reform, Restructuring and Development (RR&D) unit, Assistant Commissioner of Police (ACP) John Simons.

The Special Representative of the African Union Commission Chairperson (SRCC) for Somalia and Head of ATMIS, Ambassador Mohamed El-Amine Souef, and other top ATMIS officials were part of the delegation.

Ambassador Souef and Lt Gen Kavuma pledged to enhance the capacity of the Somali Security Forces and intensify military offensives against Al-Shabaab.

"The African Union will never abandon Somalia and its people in their quest for peace and stability," said Ambassador Souef, during a meeting with local leaders in Dinsoor district, Bay region.

He commended ATMIS troops for their contributions to peace and security in Somalia and urged continued collaboration with the Somali Security Forces (SSF). Lt Gen Kavuma promised sustained operations against Al-Shabaab to restore security and protect ATMIS positions from attacks.

"We need to support the Federal Member States and the Federal Government to build the capacity of the Somali Security Forces to secure the country," he added.

"IwanttothanktheKenyaDefence Forces (KDF) for their excellent work in improving peace and security in the area. Their efforts have made a big difference. For example, the seaport and airport are operational and there is a lot of development taking place in the region," he said.

Lt Gen Kavuma also held a closeddoor meeting with the ATMIS Kenya Contingent Commander, Brigadier Seif Salim Rashid, and senior ATMIS military and police officers.

Brig Rashid briefed Lt Gen Kavuma on the security situation in the region, ongoing peace support operations and humanitarian initiatives.

Kenya, alongside Burundi, Djibouti, Ethiopia and Uganda, is one of the Troop Contributing Countries (TCCs) to ATMIS. The Kenya Defence Force (KDF) is responsible for securing the Lower Juba region of southern Somalia.

AU, UN, FGS and international partners discuss post-ATMIS

In September, representatives from the African Union (AU), United Nations (UN), Federal Government of Somalia (FGS), Troop Contributing Countries and international partners engaged in extensive discussions on the transition and financing of the mission to succeed the African Union Transition Mission in Somalia (ATMIS).



The engagements focused on preparing a comprehensive report on the overall mission design and financing options for the African Union Support and Stabilisation Mission in Somalia (AUSSOM), as requested by UN Security Council Resolution 2748 (2024).

The delegation held meetings with stakeholders, including the FGS's National Security Advisor, Hussein Sheikh-Ali, FGS Ministry of Defence, ATMIS Troop Contributing Countries, and international partners such as the US, UK, Qatar, China, and Türkiye.

AUSSOM is scheduled to commence on 1 January 2025, immediately after ATMIS mandate ends on 31 December 2024. This transition follows the adoption of the Concept of Operations (CONOPs) for AUSSOM by the AU Peace and Security Council (PSC) at its 1225th meeting on 1st August 2024. The African Union delegation was led by the Head of Peace Support Operations Division (PSOD), Directorate of Conflict Cheick Management, Gen. while Dembele, the United Nations team was headed by the Director for Eastern Africa Division, Department of Political and Peacebuilding Affairs and Operations. Ambassador Graham Maitland.

To meet the November 2024 deadline for reporting back to the UN Security Council, the joint delegation organized its work into various streams, with representation from the AU, FGS, and the United Nations Support Office in Somalia (UNSOS), the logistical support partner for both ATMIS and the Somali National Armed Forces (SNAF).

"The engagements have been very productive and have provided clarity and a sense of ownership for the successor mission. We have been discussing the details for the follow-on mission because the FGS, AMISOM, and ATMIS have achieved tremendous success, and we need to reduce ATMIS's footprint to fit the requirements of the new mission" Gen. Dembele said.

He added that the involvement of international partners underscored the global commitment to Somalia's stability and security, with their input on transition strategies and potential financing models being key to AUSSOM's successful implementation.

Echoing Gen. Dembele's sentiments, Ambassador Graham Maitland elaborated that the delegation had initiated a collaborative process to discuss and analyse all aspects for the new mission.

"We are doing a lot of discussions, including designing the mission structure, the transition planning, and the critical issue of financing. We hope to meet the timelines," he added.

The insights gained from the comprehensive discussions will inform the final report to be presented to the UN Security Council, shaping the future of international support for Somalia's peace and security efforts.

Phase Three troop drawdown

ATMIS handed over seven Forward Operating Bases (FOBs) to the Somali National Armed Forces (SNAF) and pulled out 4000 troops in Phase Three drawdown conducted between June and September as mandated by the United Nations Security Council Resolution 2741 (2024).



ATMIS KDF trained on civilian protection

On 8 June, thirty ATMIS Kenya contingent officers concluded an intense five-day training on civilian protection in armed conflict situations.



The training in Dhobley, Jubaland State, covered a variety of topics critical to civilian protection efforts in peacekeeping missions.

Topics covered included protection of vulnerable groups (women and children), International Humanitarian Law, International Human Rights Law, and prevention of sexual exploitation and abuse.

"The main goal of the training was to improve civilian protection efforts in peacekeeping missions," said Ms. Gloria Jaase, ATMIS Senior Protection and Human Rights Officer. "We aim to equip peacekeepers with the necessary knowledge and skills to respond effectively to situations that affect civilian safety and well-being," she added.

The training is part of ongoing efforts to prioritise civilian protection during conflicts, as mandated by UN Security Council Resolution 2628 (2022).

In addition, under International Humanitarian Law (IHL), armed combatants are obligated to protect civilians from dangers arising from military operations and ensure that those with specific needs receive the protection and care they require.

ATMIS Kenya contingent Commander, Brig. Seif Salim Rashid emphasised the importance of the training in protecting local communities and supporting Somalia's National Stabilisation Strategy.

"As we work towards promoting peace in Somalia, it's essential to prioritisecivilian protection, human rights, and conflict prevention by fostering cordial relations with the local communities and our Somali counterparts," observed Brig. Seif.

The participants appreciated the training and called for similar capacity building workshops.

"The course facilitators demonstrated mastery of content with a vast wealth of knowledge and real-life experiences, which bolstered my understanding of the concepts," said Lt. Arnold Kiprono.

Abshiro Rashid from the Dhobley General Hospital said: "I'm happy to be graduating today. Previously I worked as an Assistant midwife, now I am taking on the role of a midwife. I will urge the ATMIS to continue with this training programme so we can support our communities"

Beyond mentorship, the ATMIS Level II hospital serves as a referral center for Dhobley General Hospital patients requiring specialised medical services and emergency surgical procedures.

Somali National Army Commander in Dhobley, Capt. Qorane Mohamed, Dhobley Deputy District Commissioner, Mukhtar Mohamed and other senior local administration officials attended the graduation ceremony.

A comprehensive medical training manual has been produced for the graduates to train future cohorts, ensuring programme long term sustainability for the programme.


